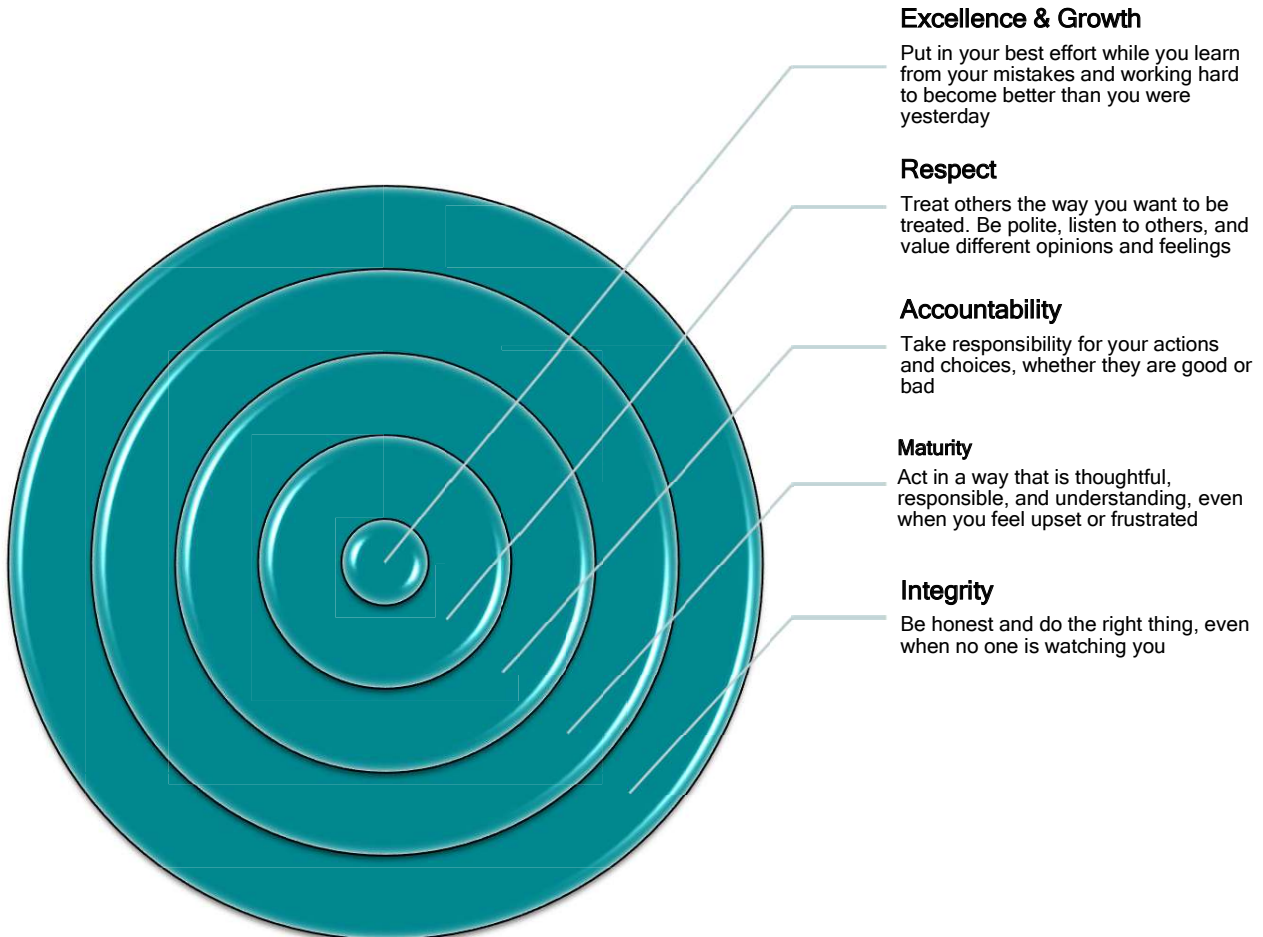

Our sport program, which we run through Ntsiks Football Stars, have not only grown in strength but also instilled discipline, teamwork, and resilience values that protect our boys from negative influences such as substance abuse. We are encouraged by the steady improvement of our football team, which reflects the dedication of our coaches and the determination of the boys themselves. The football club performance has improved from 48.4% in 2024 to 52.4% in 2025 and continue to improve when compared to the previous years. We are thrilled to have had an opportunity to collaborate with Build-it to host the annual Rondebult Build-it U13 festival, an event we hope to continue hosting.

At the same time, we recognize that discipline and respect remain key pillars of our mission. 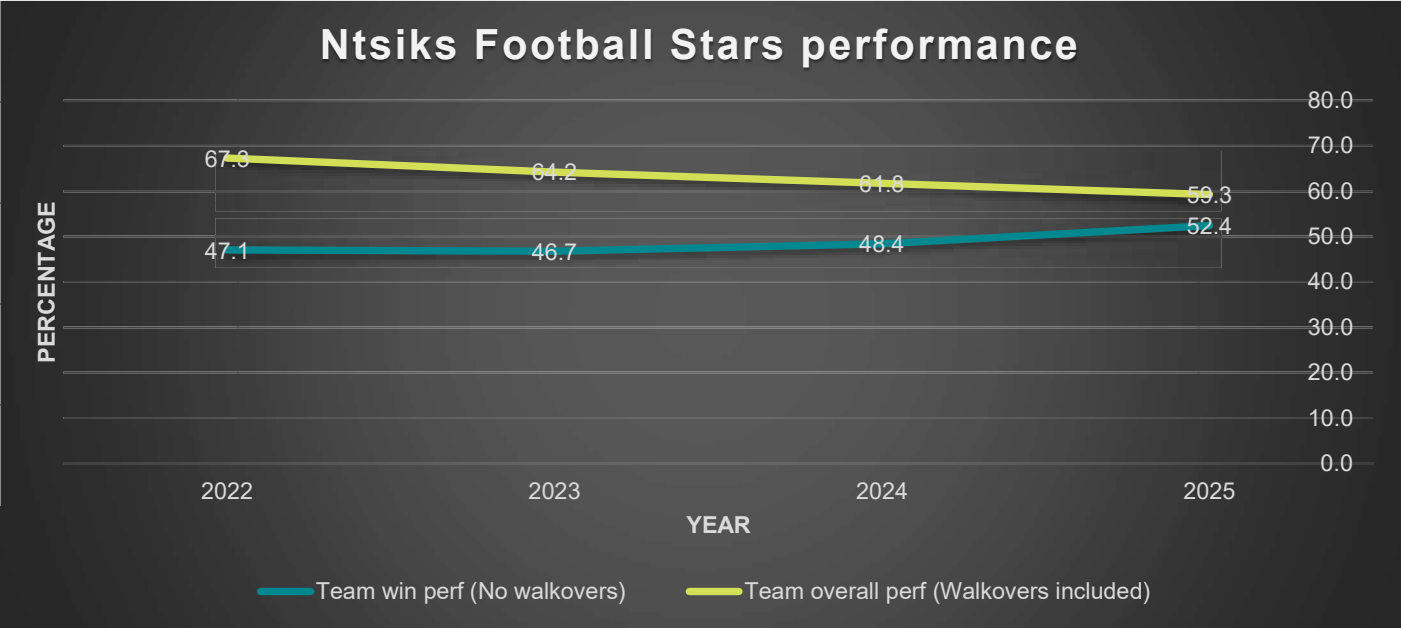

BCLFA League competition



The performance data of Ntsiks Football Stars (NFS) from 2022 to 2025 tells a compelling story of transformation, discipline, and structured development across multiple youth divisions. Over these four years, the club has demonstrated unwavering commitment to nurturing young talent through consistent participation, strategic coaching, and a strong developmental philosophy. Each age group from Under 11 to Under 17 reflects a unique stage of growth, yet all share a common thread of continuous improvement, teamwork, and resilience. The data not only captures match

statistics but also serves as evidence of a well-managed system focused on both athletic and personal development. From early foundational years where players learn basic coordination and game awareness, to the senior divisions where tactical intelligence and leadership emerge, NFS has built a progressive model of youth football excellence. This steady rise in performance reveals a holistic ecosystem where discipline, mentorship, and community values intersect to shape players who are not only stronger on the field but also more responsible, confident, and emotionally intelligent off it.



Between 2022 and 2025, the overall performance of Ntsiks Football Stars (NFS) improved from 47.1% to 52.7%, marking a 5.6 percentage point increase over three competitive seasons. The improvement from 47.1% represents a phase where the club was still consolidating its developmental structures refining its coaching methods, identifying player strengths, and establishing team discipline. During this early stage, match outcomes likely fluctuated due to uneven experience levels, limited cohesion, and the adjustment period required for young players to adapt to competitive structures. However, as the seasons progressed, these foundational efforts began to yield measurable results. By 2025, the rise to 52.7% reflects stronger tactical execution, increased player confidence, and a clearer understanding of positional play and teamwork principles. This growth trajectory demonstrates a shift from individual development to collective performance, where success is driven less by isolated talent and more by unified strategy. The enhanced coordination among divisions from Under 11 to Under 17 suggests that the club’s philosophy of “growing together” is producing tangible outcomes. Furthermore, the increase signifies that players are learning to convert opportunities into results, minimize costly errors, and sustain mental focus across matches.

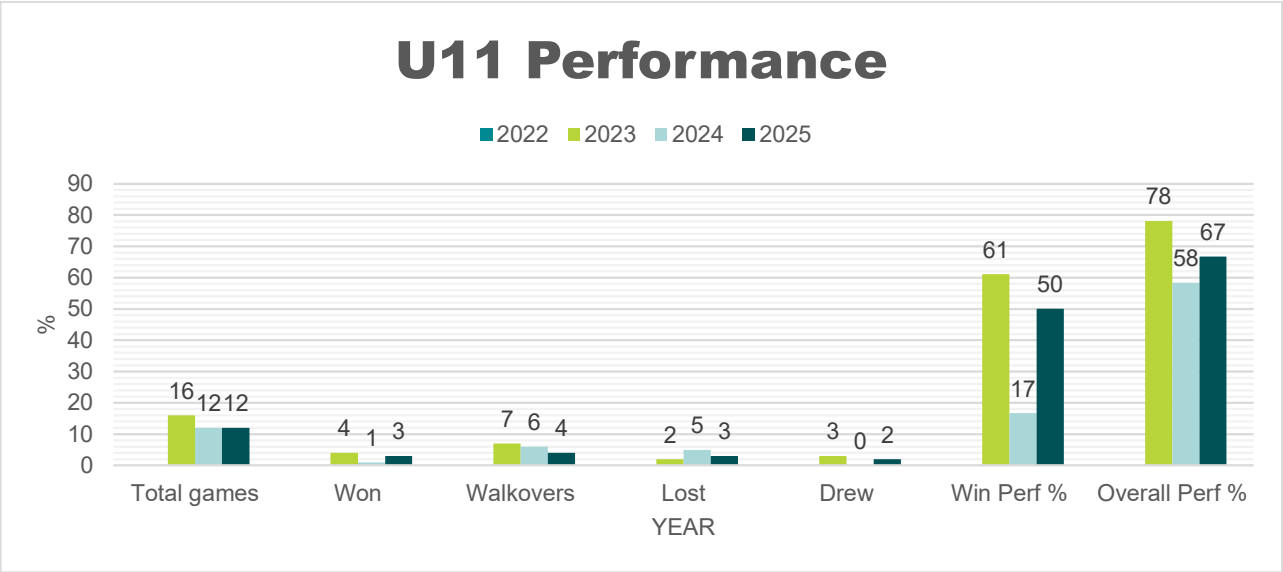
In essence, the improvement from 47.1% to 52.4% is more than a numerical statistic it is a reflection of organizational learning, coaching excellence, and the evolving maturity of young athletes. It signals that NFS is moving from a foundational phase toward sustained competitiveness, proving that strategic patience and continuous investment in development yield long-term success. If the same trajectory continues, the club is positioned to surpass the 60% performance mark in coming seasons, establishing itself not only as a youth football powerhouse but also as a model for holistic player development and community-driven sport excellence.

Performance evolution per division

Under 11 Division

The Under 11 team’s record shows a developmental curve characterized by early experimentation and gradual improvement. In 2023, they played 16 games, securing 4 wins, 3 draws, and 2 losses, with several walkovers recorded. Their win performance was around 61%, while the overall performance stood at 78%. By 2025, despite playing fewer games (12 total), the team achieved a 50% win rate and an overall performance of 67%, which helped them improve their league position from number 4 in 2024 to number 3 in 2025. With this position securing

a bronze medal. This suggests a core of young players learning structure, teamwork, and game awareness. While their win ratio fluctuated slightly, the consistent participation provided an essential foundation for tactical growth.



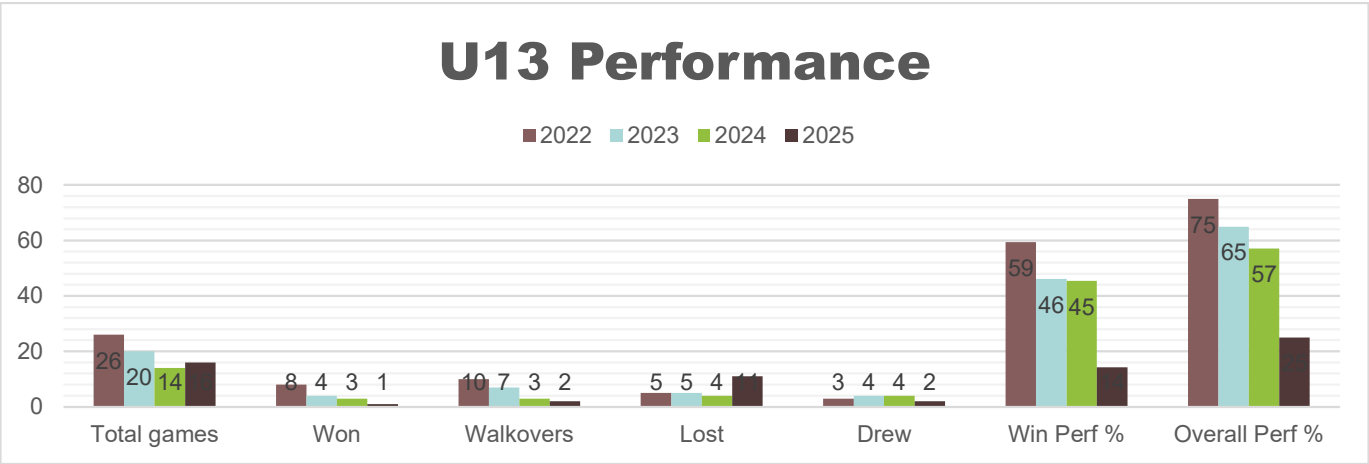

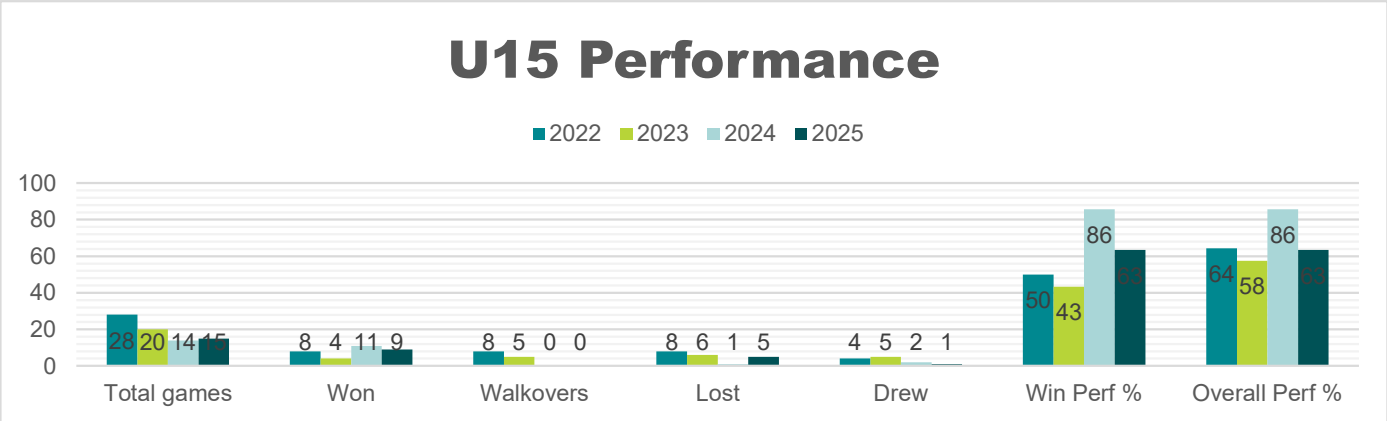
Under 13 Division

The Under 13 division experienced one of the most challenging seasons during the 2025 season, with overall performance level falling drastically below expectations compared to the 2024 season. The team’s results reflected inconsistency, limited goal conversion, and occasional lapses in concentration during key moments of play. While other divisions such as the Under 15 and Under 17 teams showed clear upward trajectories, the Under 13 group struggled to maintain momentum, with the league position dropping from number 3 (bronze medal) in 2024 to second last position in 2025. However, the Under 13 team’s challenges also present valuable learning opportunities for both the players and the coaching staff. Basic technical mastery (such as first touch, passing under pressure, and shooting accuracy) while gradually introducing tactical discipline may be the point of focus in the coming season. In essence, the Under 13 team’s underperformance should not be seen as failure, but as a developmental checkpoint. It underscores the need for patience, consistent mentoring, and strategic focus on fundamentals. With a balanced approach that strengthens both skill and mindset, this age group has the potential to rebound strongly and contribute meaningfully to NFS’s long-term success pipeline.



Under 15 Division

The Under 15 team exhibits signs of tactical maturity and evolving leadership within the squad. Across the seasons, performance results suggest a balance between competitiveness and learning. Occasional dips in form appear to be linked to transitions in player groups or challenges in consistency, but recovery patterns are evident in subsequent seasons. The team though could not defend its championship but still performed well and ended in position number 3, receiving a bronze medal.

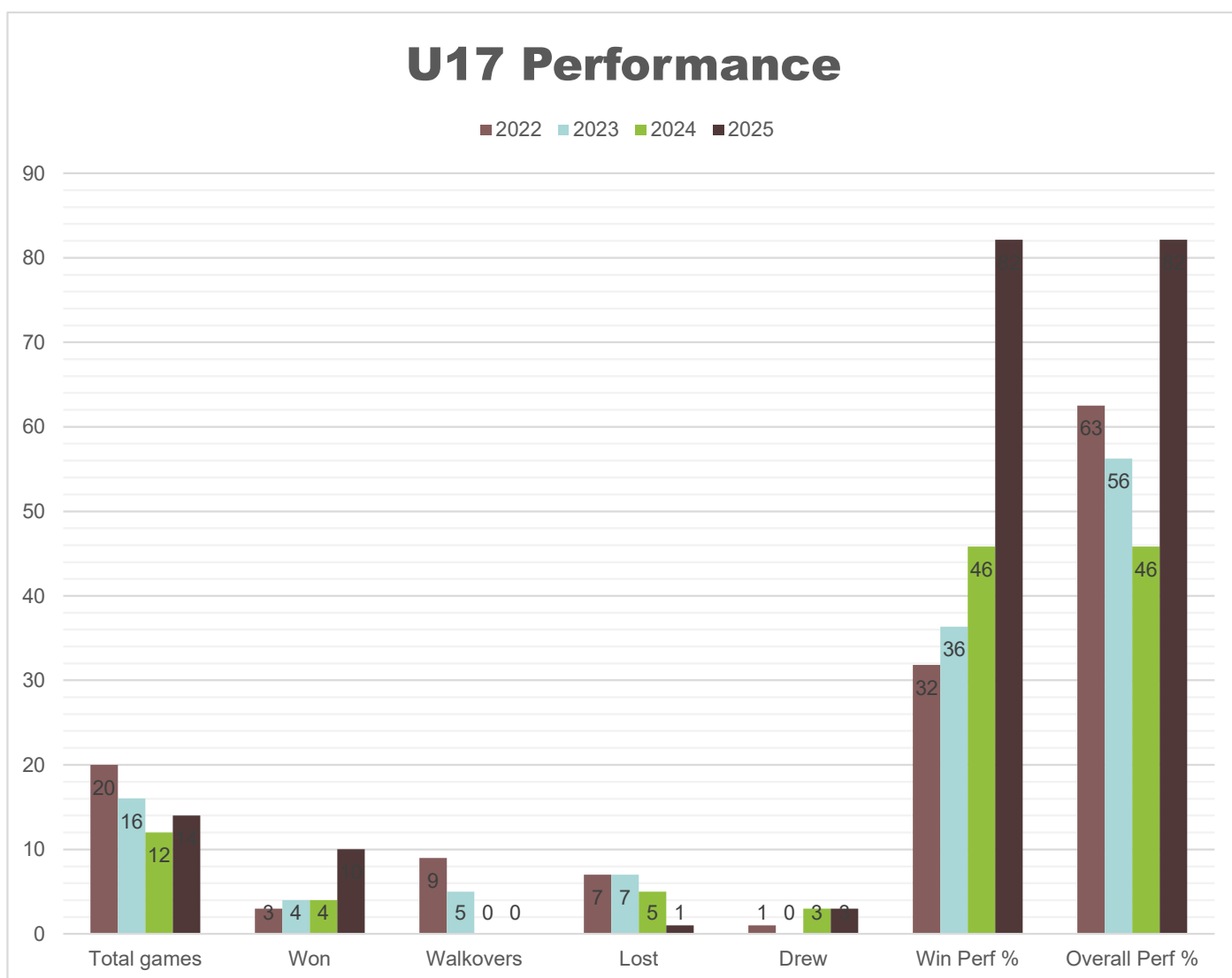

Under 17 Division

The Under 17 data reflects the most compelling transformation in the club. In 2022, the team registered a modest 31% win rate, with 20 total games and a relatively high number of losses and walkovers. By 2025, the same division achieved an 82% win rate, one of the highest indicators of progress across all NFS categories. This surge demonstrates how long-term investment in coaching, mentorship, and structured competition pays off. The graph in this division is been upward since 2022 showing a sign of growth. During this season the division only lost 1 game out of the 14 games. From this marvelous performance this division ended at position number 1 at the end of the 2025 season and being crowned the BCLFA U17 2025 Champions.

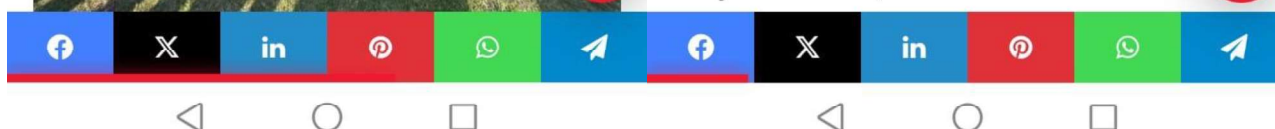

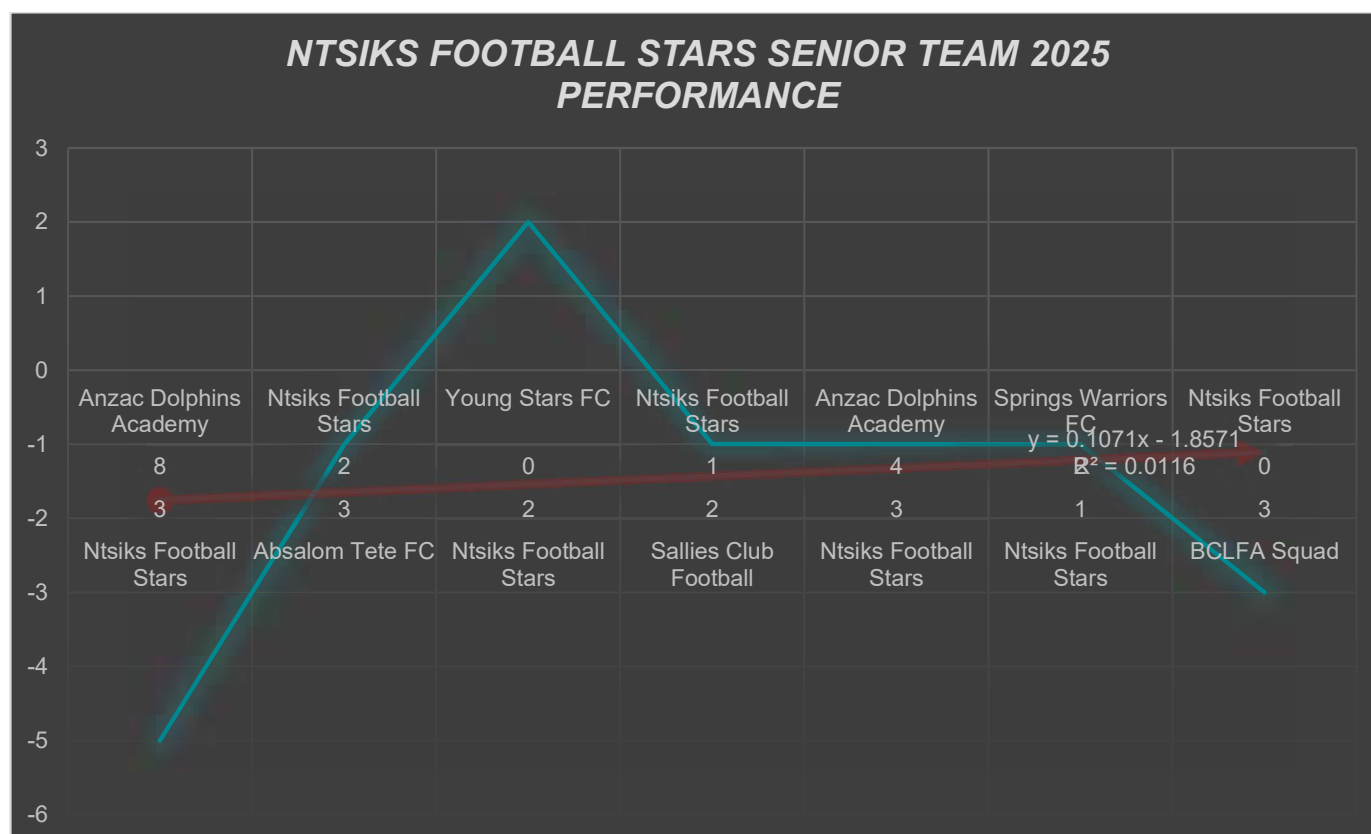

Senior Team

In the 2023/2024 season, Ntsiks Football Stars (NFS) introduced a Senior Team as a natural progression for players graduating from the junior ranks. However, the initiative faced early challenges. The team struggled to maintain attendance consistency, leading to poor match-day turnouts, incomplete squads, and a lack of tactical stability. These issues culminated in the team finishing last in the standings, prompting management to suspend senior-level participation for the following season. The experience revealed that while there was abundant talent within the club, logistical challenges and commitment gaps made it difficult to compete sustainably at senior level during that period. At the beginning of 2025, renewed pressure emerged from a group of loyal NFS players some of whom had been with the foundation since its inception, who were no longer eligible to play in junior divisions but remained passionate about representing the team. Their unwavering dedication reflected the strong sense of belonging and identity fostered by the Foundation. Additionally, current junior players in their final season (U17) expressed a strong desire for a senior team revival, seeing it as a pathway to continue their football journey within the NFS family rather than seeking opportunities elsewhere.

In response, management adopted a strategic testing phase throughout 2025, organizing a series of friendly matches to assess player commitment, team chemistry, and logistical feasibility. Data from these matches revealed a team still finding its rhythm but with evident growth potential. Out of seven matches, NFS secured two victories, including an encouraging 2–0 win against Young Stars FC, which highlighted the team's attacking creativity and defensive discipline when fully committed. However, inconsistencies in attendance and focus persisted in other fixtures, contributing to mixed results and a slightly negative goal difference overall.



Management reached the decision to reintroduce the Senior Team for the 2025/2026 season and intend to join the Brakpan Central Local Football Association's Super League with a renewed focus on commitment, structure, and player accountability. This renewed approach ensures that senior players are not abandoned after years of dedication but are instead integrated into the long-term vision of Ntsiks Football Stars where football serves as both a developmental pathway and a lifelong source of belonging.

Kgoloko Thobejane Tournament

One of the most inspiring highlights of the senior team's revival journey came during the Kgoloko Thobejane Heritage Day Tournament held in Benoni. This event represented more than just a football competition; it symbolized a rebirth of hope, identity, and unity for Ntsiks Football Stars (NFS). The tournament brought together several competitive community clubs, including the formidable Crystal Park FC, who ultimately emerged as champions. Although NFS did not win, the team's spirited performance earned them silver medals, a recognition that carried immense emotional and motivational value. The event also reignited enthusiasm among the Ntsiks Foundation family and the broader Benoni football community, many of whom followed updates through the Ntsiks Foundation Facebook page. This recognition served as a morale boost not just for the senior team but for the entire Foundation, proving that participation, effort, and character remain central to the NFS ethos. The match, though ending in defeat, was a victory in spirit confirming that the senior team's reformation was not just a possibility, but a necessity for maintaining the continuum of growth from the junior divisions to adulthood. In essence, the Heritage Day tournament reflected the heart of Ntsiks Football Stars: resilience in adversity, pride in representation, and the belief that every challenge contributes to future triumph. It validated the Foundation's mission to nurture not only players but responsible young men who find identity, brotherhood, and purpose through football.



Educational tours and constructive engagements

Educational tours



A surprisingly wide range of interests can be found on the reserve. These include larger species like black wildebeest, red hartebeest, and zebra. Additionally, there are objects of historical, cultural, geological, botanical, and archaeological significance. There are also other protected species and red data mentioned. Our boys had an opportunity to see some of these species, some being the zebras, wildebeest as well as historical, cultural significance.



Amongst what the boys have learned during this tour is the Archaeological evidence that shows the reserve was once inhabited by Stone Age and Iron Age communities, with artifacts such as tools, pottery, and rock engravings still found in the area and that later it was home to the BaTswana people, who built stone-walled settlements that can still be seen today, giving insight into their way of life, trade, and farming practices.



In addition to providing many advantages, trails are essential for fostering connections between towns, nature, people, and culture. By focusing human activity in certain locations, they prevent damage and soil erosion, preserve natural habitats, and provide avenues for conservation education. From a health standpoint, trails promote physical activities like walking, hiking, and cycling, which enhance fitness and promote mental health by lowering stress and providing chances for outdoor relaxation. In this hiking the management and boys took a trail of 10kms. In a social sense, they serve as common areas that unite communities, protect historical and cultural legacy, and foster inclusivity by welcoming a range of groups. In terms of the economy, trails provide sustainable transportation options, increase municipal revenue, draw tourists, and raise property values. They also serve as outdoor schools that promote stewardship and environmental awareness. Trails are really more than just routes; they are vital for fostering economic development, communal harmony, environmental sustainability, and wellness. Trails are

especially important to school pupils because they provide opportunities for learning, growth, and well-being beyond the classroom. Socially, trails encourage teamwork and collaboration when pupils explore them together, strengthening relationships and communication skills. They also instill values of responsibility, respect for the environment, and stewardship of natural resources, which are vital for shaping responsible future citizens. In

short, trails support pupils' holistic development by blending education, health, social interaction, and environmental awareness in a practical and engaging way.

The availability of management and or the executive committee (EXCO) during educational tours and trails or hiking activities is highly important as it strengthens both leadership presence and organizational culture. As always **Thobile Malinga and Palesa Mthetho**, executive committee members at Ntsiks Foundation were part of this tour. Their participation demonstrates commitment to boy's holistic development and shows that leadership values learning beyond the classroom. When management is present, they provide guidance, ensure safety, and model responsible behavior, which reinforces discipline and accountability amongst the boys. Their availability also creates opportunities for mentorship, as boys can engage with leaders in a more relaxed, open environment that encourages dialogue and inspiration. Additionally, management's presence helps align the tour or hiking activity with the school or organization's broader educational goals, ensuring that the experience is not only recreational but also contributes to academic, social, and character development. From a motivational standpoint, boys

often feel valued and encouraged when leaders take time to join them, which boosts morale and strengthens trust. Overall, the involvement of management or EXCO ensures safety, enhances the educational impact, and fosters stronger connections between leadership, staff, and learners.



Constructive engagements



Whenever we get an opportunity to engage young boys, we make it a priority to do so, no matter where the setting may be. Whether it is during formal programs, outdoor activities, educational tours, community events, or even informal interactions, we use every chance to mentor, guide, and inspire them. These moments allow us to instill positive values, teach life skills, and provide support that shapes their character and outlook on life. The Foundation's founder and Chairperson Mr. Ntsikelelo Makaka took an opportunity during the Build-it U13 festival that was held at Rondebult ground to engage the boys from different clubs.

By engaging them consistently in different spaces, we ensure that learning and growth are not limited to classrooms but become part of their everyday experiences, helping them develop into responsible and confident



young men. Mr. Bonginkosi Hlongwana from the Boksburg correctional Services, who also had a team that was participating in the tournament took a jab in engaging the young boys encouraging them to rather focus on sport rather than being in the streets not doing anything and may find themselves being friends with wrong people who may ruin their future



Given the opportunity to motivate the boys during the BCLFA 2025 awards ceremony (25th October 2025 @ Brakpan Stadium), the Ntsiks Foundation chairperson, Mr. Ntsikelelo Makaka, embraced it wholeheartedly as it aligned perfectly with the mission of shaping and guiding young men for a brighter future. In his message, he commended them for the dedication, effort, and teamwork that had brought them this far, reminding them that their success on the football field was the result of discipline, focus, and persistence. He emphasized that these same qualities should be carried into their studies, especially with exams approaching. Encouraged them to take care of their books, manage their time wisely, and show the same determination in the classroom that they show during matches. The aim was to inspire them to understand that true success is not only measured by goals scored, but also by the knowledge they gain and the responsible choices they make for their future.

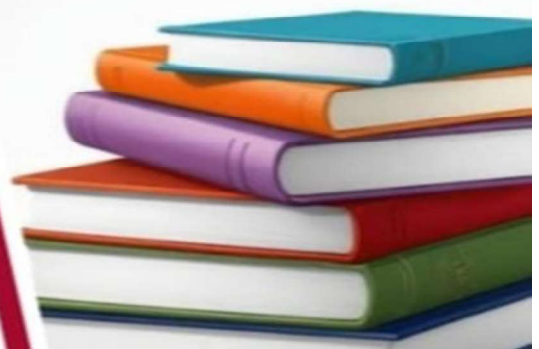

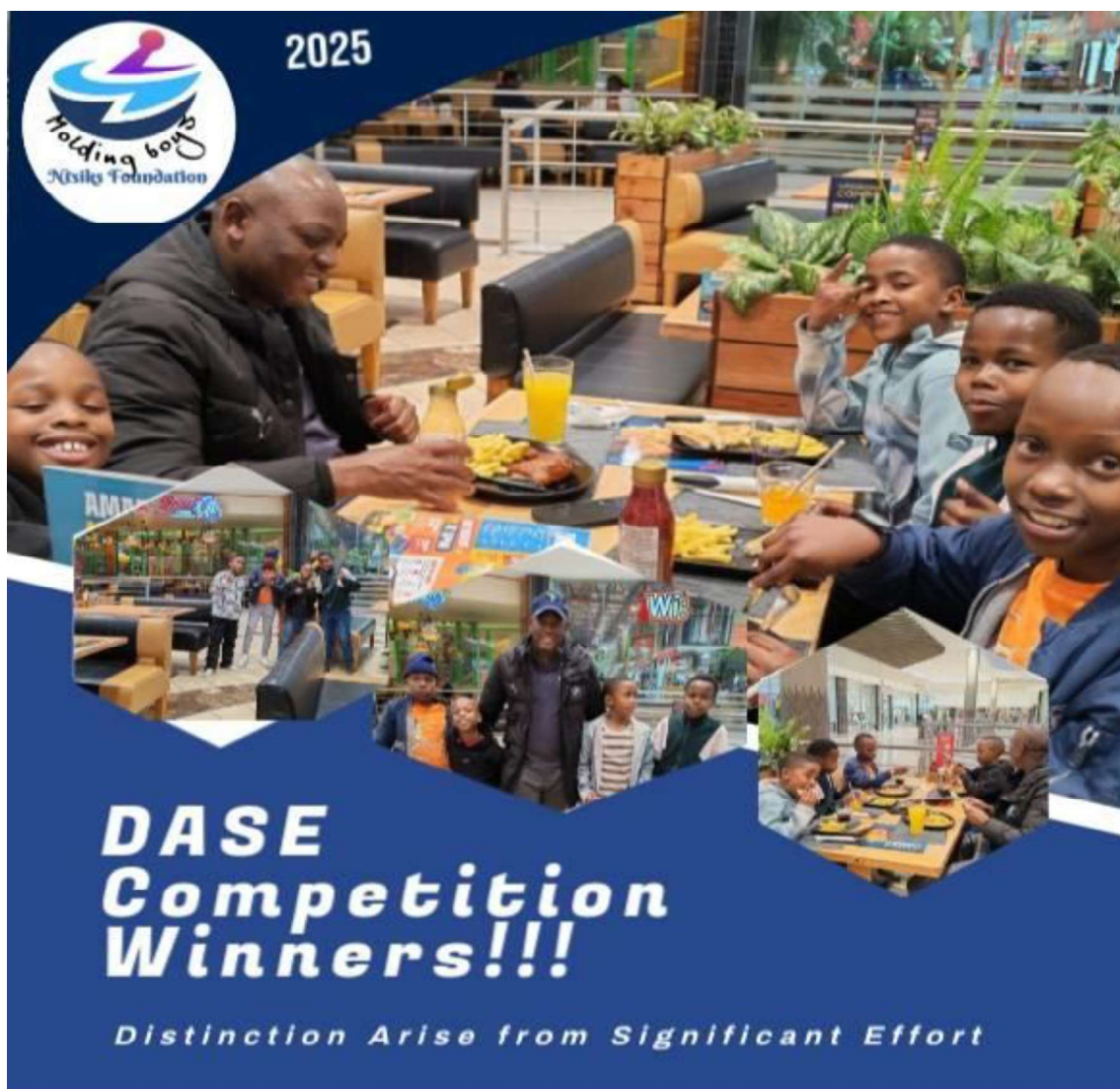
Molding young boys



The foundation has improved its support for education. The goal of the DASE Competition is to motivate boys to study and/or remember their books, therefore it has been strengthened. Four boys are taken to lunch by the by the foundation in each term. Only one boy per division has the opportunity to be taken for lunch; but if there are no winners in a division, two or more boys from one division may be taken, but no more than four boys may be taken for lunch per term. The top qualifier receives an opportunity, and the requirement to be considered and or stand a chance to win is an overall average percentage of 75% and above.



Term 1 winners were Oratile Malatsi (U11), Tusinkosi Makhoba (U11), and Phemelo Serumo (U13). The boys were brought to the Carnival mall's Silver Wolf Spur. Through its Kids Achiever Awards, Silver Wolf Spur has committed to helping the Foundation with this project. This outing was enjoyable for the boys. They played with the restaurant's amenities and relished the cuisine. It was not just about eating; positive interactions occurred, encouraging boys to concentrate on their studies, respect seniors, and act appropriately in public. We received 13% of entries in this term, and 33% of those submissions were distinctions; their overall term average percentage was more than 75%.

Boys who received better percentages were taken out for lunch as we continued in term 2 with our DASE Competition. Tusinkosi and Oratile (U11) were still part of the group of boys who won on term 2. Anga Geza (U13) and Hlelo Nkosi (U13) joined this time around. The submission percent increased during this term from 13% in term 1 to 31% in term 2. This is an indication that this competition gained traction.

Distinctions were slightly below the term 1 percentage and this time around seating at 32% which is just 1% below the term 1 percentage.

Sharing available scholarships

Informing young boys about available scholarships is just as important as offering the scholarships themselves, because access to opportunities often depends on knowledge. Many boys, especially those in disadvantaged communities, miss out on life-changing opportunities simply because they were never made aware of them. Sharing information about scholarships gives them the chance to envision a brighter future and to realize that education can be within their reach regardless of financial or social background. When young boys are informed about scholarships, it expands their horizon of possibilities. They begin to see education not as a burden or an impossible dream but as a pathway to success. This according to Ntsiks Foundation is a knowledge that motivates them to take their studies seriously, to stay disciplined, and to avoid negative distractions that can derail their progress. Awareness creates hope, and hope fuels determination.

Additionally, informing boys about scholarships builds a culture of preparation. Once they know opportunities exist, they can start working toward the requirements, whether it is improving their grades, participating in extracurricular activities, or developing leadership qualities. This guidance gives structure and purpose to their growth, and it instills the values of planning and perseverance. Without knowledge, only a select few benefit, often those with better networks or more resources. Actively informing boys about scholarships ensures that opportunities are accessible to all, including those who may otherwise be overlooked. This levels the playing field and nurtures a generation of boys who are empowered to contribute positively to their families and communities.
